GENERAL CONDITIONS

This show is held under the Rules and Regulations of the Queensland Chamber of Agricultural Societies and the Rules and By-Laws of the Mossman and District Show Society Inc. (Although the substance of some of the Rules of the Society are set out here under, for emphasis and general direction, this Statement of Conditions shall not be deemed to be an exhaustive statement of the Rules and By-Laws of the Society, all of which shall be in full force and application.)

For particulars of Entry Fees, dates of closing of entries, dates and times for delivery of exhibits and special conditions relative to the particular Sections see the head notes to the individual Sections appearing in this schedule. Intending exhibitors are advised to read the Schedule carefully and to be sure to enter exhibits in the correct Classes.

MEMBERSHIP SUBSCRIPTION FAMILY tickets of \$45.00 carries the privilege of two adult tickets, plus a ticket for each of the Member's dependent children. Each ticket will admit the bearer to the Show throughout the whole period thereof (both Sunday and Monday) as often as desired. Tickets must be produced otherwise ordinary admission will be charged.

<u>ADULT SINGLE</u> tickets of \$25.00 are available to adults over 18 years of age. <u>CHILD SINGLE</u> tickets of \$10.00 are available to all school aged children. Such tickets will entitle admission to the grounds as above but no entitlement as Members of the Society.

<u>PENSIONER (2)</u> tickets are available for \$25.00. <u>PENSIONER SINGLE</u> tickets are available for \$15.00 Entrance to the grounds for NON – MEMBERSHIP TICKET HOLDERS will be charged at the DAILY RATE: Adults: \$20.00, Children: \$10.00 (Children under school age are admitted free). **Pensioners:** \$10.00 (Pensioners must present evidence of entitlement).

The Committee shall have full control of all personnel on the grounds, and through its' Stewards and other Officials, the conduct and management of the Show. Persons admitted or claiming to be admitted to the grounds shall be subject to the Regulations of the Committee; and the Committee reserves the right by its' Executive Officers, Stewards, or other Officials or nominees: -

- (a) To refuse to admit to the grounds or;
- (b) Expel and remove from the grounds any person or persons whose conduct (past or present) is in the opinion of such Committee, Executive Officer's, Stewards or other Officials or nominees such as to warrant such action.

Entries in the show must be made on the Entry Forms provided by the Society and must be in the hands of the Secretary by the stipulated date thereof, together with the Entry Fees without which no Entry will be accepted. Exceptions to this Rule will however, be made in such Sections (in particular the Horticulture, Agriculture and Culinary Sections) where the Stewards thereof on their discretion permit having reference in particular to time available for completion of Section Books and preparation for Judging. Exceptions will also be made in the case of the Ring Events where (with the exception of "Local" events) entries will be accepted up to such time as the Stewards in their absolute discretion deem fit.

In all Sections, it is a condition of entry that the Society will not under any circumstances, be held responsible for any loss, damage, or miss delivery of any livestock or other exhibit or exhibits at the Society's Show, or for any accident that may be caused through or by any exhibit. The arrangement of exhibits will be in the sole control of the Stewards. Exhibits entered in the wrong Class by the Exhibitor may be transferred to the proper Class by the Stewards.

The Judges may award Certificates of Commendation in addition to awards mentioned in the Schedule, or may withhold any Prize if in their opinion the exhibit is not of sufficient merit. The decision of the Judge or Judges shall be final. The Committee reserves the right to substitute trophies donated after printing of Schedules in lieu of cash prizes.

Supplementary Schedules may be issued at the discretion of the Committee.

At all times the commencement of delivery of exhibits until the opening of the Hall for general exhibition the Hall shall be under the control of the stewards therein, who shall have full power to refuse admittance or cause expulsion from the Hall of any person or persons other than those who, in the opinion of the Stewards have lawful occasion to be in such Hall.

The Committee reserves the right to reduce Prize money for any event, or to cancel the event, if in the opinion of the Committee paucity of entries and/or competitors for such an event does not warrant the amount of Prize Money awarded.

The Society will not under any circumstances, be liable for any accident on the grounds or premises.

The Committee may refuse any entry without giving reasons for so doing.

Any person entering a protest in connection with the Show shall lodge the sum of \$50.00 with the Secretary. The onus of proof shall be with the Lodger of the protest. The Committee shall decide all protests and their decision shall be final. If in the opinion of the Committee the protest may be frivolous the deposit shall be forfeited. In the hearing of all protests and disputes arising out of an award, the Committee shall abide by the Judges books unless it is shown that the Judge has been willfully or accidentally mislead. Protests must be in writing and must be lodged with the Secretary before the day of judging. A protest in any particular class may only be made by a competitor in that class.

No exhibit may be removed before 7.00 pm on the Monday of the Show without the permission of the Section Stewards.

The Rules and By-Laws first above mentioned and the foregoing Statement of Conditions and the notes set forth in the Schedule hereafter appearing, are to be the conditions of the Show and of competition herein. The Committee, whose decision shall be final, shall determine any matter arising, not herein provided for.

ACCEPTANCE OF ENTRIES: The attention of intending exhibitors is drawn to the fact that entries are accepted subject to the Rules of the Queensland Chamber of Agricultural Societies and to the Constitution and Rules of this Society in addition to any special regulations which appear within this Schedule.

Please note hours for Jack Street Gate are as follows


Sunday



THE EXHIBITOR MUST MAKE ALL EXHIBITS.

COVID-19 HEALTH REGULATIONS REQUIRE THAT:

- ALL ENTRIES MUST BE PRESENTED ON DISPOSABLE PAPER PLATES JUST LARGE ENOUGH TO HOLD THEM.
- <u>FOOD ENTRIES</u> THAT ARE STILL SEALED, ARE INACCESSIBLE TO THE PUBLIC, AND/OR NOT SAMPLED CAN BE RETURNED AND DO NOT REQUIRE DISPOSAL
- <u>FOOD ENTRIES</u> THAT HAVE BEEN HANDLED AND SAMPLED BY A JUDGE ARE TO BE DISPOSED OF BY THE SHOW ORGANIZERS. IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE SHOW ORGANISERS TO DISPOSE OF ALL FOOD ENTRIES.

Points Awarded: 2 points - 1st prize: 1 point - 2nd prize

Exhibits to be grown by and be the property of the exhibitor. Exhibit eligible for one Class only. Exhibiting in the Show is not hard, but to be successful you must take time and care. Read the Schedule carefully.

Enter the Exhibit in the correct Class. If the type of Exhibit that you wish to enter is not individually listed in the schedule there are Classes for any other variety (A.O.V.) of fruit and vegetable. If in doubt of the class ask the Steward for advice.

It is at the discretion of the Stewards or the Judge to make new classes if the numbers and quality within a class warrant doing so. This includes the A.O.V. classes.

Enter the correct number as asked for in the Schedule. The Judge has no option but to disqualify Exhibits that do not have the correct number of items no matter how good the quality may be.

Selecting Note for butter and cheese - Butter and cheese may be displayed in a round take-away container with lid

FARM PRODUCE: Class 95, 96, 101-105, 145 & 145 – All classes to be sampled, a small amount is to be placed into a small sauce container. This container will be disposed of after the show.

PLEASE NOTE THAT THERE IS NOW A JUNIOR SECTION FOR FRUIT, VEGETABLES AND FARM PRODUCE – CHILD UNDER 15 YEARS OF AGE. CHILDS AGE MUST APPEAR ON ENTRY FORM. ALL PRODUCE MUST BE GROWN BY CHILD.

SELECTING THE EXHIBIT FRUIT:

Fruit should be clipped from the bush, not pulled. Pulling the fruit tends to tear the skin, allowing rot to develop. Clip stems longer than needed, and then carefully clip again to the required length.

BANANAS should be cut as a hand with sufficient depth of cushion left to hold the hand intact during the handling and benching. Fruit should be washed to remove dust and spray residue.

CITRUS should be clipped to leave the button on the fruit. Stalks left on the fruit can easily spike adjacent fruit. Stalks to be clipped to 2-3mm intact. A soft brush can be used on citrus to remove scale insects and surface mould.

PAWPAWS and PINEAPPLES should be cut with 25-50mm. of stem which should then carefully trimmed close to the base of the fruit leaving 2-3mm of stalk intact. Wipe fruit with a soft clean cloth to remove any dust.

PASSIONFRUIT and GRANADILLAS should be snapped or cut at the joint and the bract carefully removed to leave a clean stem.

STRAWBERRIES should have about 10mm. of stem attached. Always pick more fruit than is needed for the final exhibit. Put aside the largest and the smallest fruit and the most blemished. This leaves a fair average sample for selecting the exhibit. Large fruit are useful for a "one of sample" or in a collection where only one or two examples of each variety are asked for.

FRUIT GENERALLY: Select the final number of fruit for evenness of quality and size and freedom from disease and blemishes. Size is not as important as quality. It is better to put more emphasis on quality than evenness of size.

Always bring one or two spares to allow for those last minute rejects at benching time. This allows for fruit damaged in transit and any previously unnoticed blemishes to be rejected.

Fruit should be wiped with a soft cloth to remove dust, insects and sooty mould.

Fruit not mentioned above which still have stalks should be trimmed close to the fruit to avoid possible damage. Soft stalked fruit should have some stem.

Fruit, which is ripe and coloured, is preferable to uncoloured fruit, with the exception of bananas, which should be fully filled, but still green. Overripe fruit should be rejected.

VEGETABLES

BEANS and PEAS should have the stems intact. Beans should be basically straight, young and tender without any marked seed development. Samples should not be covered with plastic wrap etc., as this hinders sight and inspection of the exhibit.

CAPSICUM, CHOKO, EGG PLANT, MARROW, PUMPKIN and SQUASH should have a neatly trimmed stalk and be about 10-12mm. long.

ZUCCHINI and BUTTON SQUASH should only have 2-4mm. of stem.

TOMATOES Stalks should be snapped off at the joint rather than have the stems pulled out. In all cases, have all items in each exhibit with an even stem length.

ONIONS, LEEKS and ESCHALLOTS should be dug out and washed, and the roots trimmed to 20-25mm. long. Dead and yellowed leaves should be removed and leaf bases should be stripped back to the first unwilted layer. Use one or two rubber bands to hold the bases and tops in a neat compact bundle. Bases of bulbs should be at the same level.

RHUBARB Stalks should be even and any flaky material at the base should be removed. Ends of stalks should be cut squarely across, all leaves should be left fully intact and bundles should have one or two firm ties or rubber bands to hold the exhibit compact.

LETTUCE should be crisp and not bitter. Remove diseased or withered leaves from the base.

ROOT VEGETABLES eg. Beet, Carrot and Kohl Rabi, should be washed and have their hair roots removed. Tops should have old damaged leaves removed and be tied in a firm compact bundle with crowns at an even height.

CABBAGE and CHINESE CABBAGE should have damaged, yellowed or small outer leaves removed and leaf bases carefully trimmed away. All large fully expanded leaves should be left intact if not damaged. For Chinese cabbage a rubber band or neat tie about halfway along the length of the head holds it firmly and helps to prevent leaves breaking in transit. When preparing the exhibit hold by the roots and let the head hang down, this helps prevent leaf damage. Wash soil out of leaf bases with a moderate jet of water.

CAULIFLOWERS should be exhibited with much of the leaf canopy remaining around the curd. Curd should be white and not grainy (over mature).

BROCCOLI is cut without any leaves intact.

CHOKOS should not show any signs of seed development.

SWEET CORN Green Husk can be partly removed.

ENGLISH POTATOES should have all stalks removed and be carefully washed.

SWEET POTATOES should be trimmed neatly at both ends at the end of the main root taper. Skins in both cases should be firm and intact.

CELERY AND SILVERBEET should have 50-75mm. of roots left intact. Small outside leaves should be removed and leaf bases trimmed. One neat tie or rubber band about halfway along the stem will aid carrying and presentation.

TOMATOES AND CAPSICUM should be well coloured and full sized, however green fruit is allowed, but will be disadvantaged when competing against coloured fruit.

CHILLI and CAPSICUM Unless otherwise stated, all sweet fruit are capsicums. Hot or pungent types are chillies.

VEGETABLES GENERALLY All vegetables should have any soil washed off. General selection and presentation of vegetable exhibits is the same as for fruit. Slightly under mature is allowable. Try to avoid over mature samples.

In summary, produce should be sound, fresh, clean, typical of the variety, free of insects, insect damage or disease, mature or ripe, but not over mature or overripe, even in size, shape and colour and large by trade standards.

Don't be discouraged by this apparently awe-inspiring list of requirements. After a little experience, exhibiting is both simple and satisfying; it just takes time and care. If in doubt, ask an experienced Exhibitor or Steward, they are always most helpful.

BOTTLED/SAMPLED EXHIBITS

Use clear bottles so that the Judge may easily inspect the colour and clearness.

EGGS Eggs should be similar in size & same colour, also displayed in Egg Carton with **name on top**.

LEAFY VEGETABLES WITH ROOTS

Cover roots with wet tissue, then tie plastic bag around it (Helps keep vegetable fresh through the show)

SPECIAL NOTE in no case whatsoever may exhibits be sold within the pavilion, either by Stewards of Exhibitors. Exhibits must be collected by the Exhibitor or his authorized agent. Any exhibit in this section not collected by 9.00pm on the Monday of the show or between 8.30am. and 11.00am on the Tuesday after the show will become the property of the Show Society. Exhibits may not be removed prior to 7.00pm. on the Monday of the show.




